## The Journey of Life – The Building of a Labyrinth



The use of labyrinths in Christian practices has a history that dates to the 4th century. Early Christian labyrinths were found in places like the Basilica of St. Reparatus in Algeria, which featured the words "Sancta Ecclesia" (Holy Church) in the center, emphasizing their Christian significance. As Christianity spread, labyrinths became more prevalent in churches and cathedrals, serving as powerful tools for spiritual contemplation and prayer. A defining feature of Christian labyrinths is their

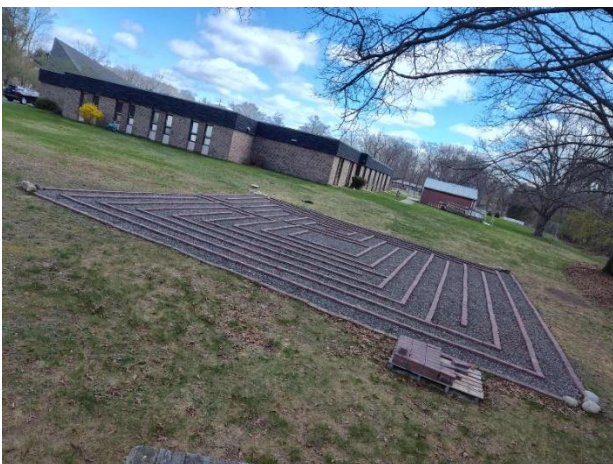
design, often following the medieval pattern that originated with the Chartres Cathedral labyrinth. This design features a single, winding path that leads to the center, symbolizing the journey of the Christian life. It became a substitute for pilgrimages to Jerusalem, allowing individuals to embark on a symbolic spiritual journey within the confines of their own community.

The spiritual significance of labyrinth walking in the Christian tradition is profound. Walking the labyrinth is seen as a form of active meditation, offering a physical representation of the spiritual journey. The twists and turns of the labyrinth mirror the challenges and obstacles one encounters in life, while the path leading to the center represents the ultimate goal of union with God. By engaging in this practice, individuals can experience a deep sense of connection, introspection, and spiritual transformation.



Over the past few weeks, a small group of us has set about the task of creating a prayer labyrinth here at White Lake UMC. The preparation began two years ago, and we are now working towards its completion. By early May the path will be ready to walk, although there will be further additions in weeks to come, adding to the beauty of this prayer space. We will have a special dedication of our prayer labyrinth soon.

Thank you to all who have taken part in this process. Thanks to Western Waters District UMC and White Lake UMC Endowment Team for the grants to make it happen. Thanks to Kyle Morningstar who laid the base, and to Alex Hayden for designing and measuring the layout.



Finally, thanks to those who have helped to lay the path itself – Jakob Dibble, Rebekah, Malakai, & Flynn Hayden, Ward Heaton, Ken Wentworth, and Bob Tuttle, Tom Hinken, and Dick Baerman for clearing the branches and debris from the area.

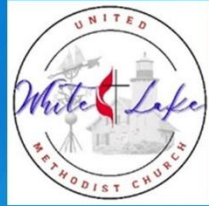

## Praise Center:

- The shed from the Praise Center will be moved to the parsonage. Lawn equipment is needed for the parsonage and will be put to good use. We will make this move when the building is sold. We will need to maintain the grass and such. Steve Welter is handling the people resources we need for mowing and lawn maintenance for the Praise Center.
- Working on maintaining what we have for and in this building. What wonderful ministry(s) it has provided since our merger in 2017. The elevator is of concern. We are needing to renew the state license for that equipment. We are asking for counsel from our real estate partners about this certificate. It is quite costly. However, not maintaining the existing certification will mean we may lose our ability to maintain the equipment as is. The elevator will not meet existing codes and may have to be brought up to code rather than maintaining our existing "Grandfathered" certification. Stay tuned.

Thank you, so much, for the continued efforts to maintain our incredible facility and the many missions it supported.

## Montague Campus:

- We are making progress with the sound and video systems. Some electronics have been added to improve the system's performance. Tom Carson is helping with the sound and video live streams. Thanks Tom.
- Continue to make some changes to the sanctuary. Pews have been removed and small tables from the Praise Center and added.
- Work is being done on the Prayer Walk. Wow, great work with the added, outside prayer area.

## IMPORTANT REQUEST

Dear Friends,

This year I am going to need your help in maintaining the native gardens in the front of the church. This includes the gardens within the bioswales and the gardens beyond the parking lot toward Hancock and Cook streets. I have many other commitments this year, so I will have to significantly reduce the amount of time I spend tending to the church native gardens.

I thought it might be helpful for me to suggest some ways that you can help me with the native landscape in front of our church in ways that won't feel overwhelming to you.

One person has helped during the past two summers by weeding and mulching under four of the yellow birch trees lining the Cook Street entrance that are surrounded by grass. This is a commitment throughout the season, but only under those four trees.

Last summer the same person edged the grass along both entrances using the church power edger.

Another person weeded and maintained the flower garden along the east edge of the parking lot, from the Cook Street entrance to the northeast corner of the lot. This included weeding the short stone paths between the parking lot and the grass that separate this garden into sections. This was a pretty big commitment, which could be split into smaller sections if we had more volunteers.

Last week someone volunteered to keep the stone paths weeded this year that go through the Pawpaw grove at the north end of the parking lot. This is a great job for people who can "tell the difference between weeds and stones", as this person proclaimed!

If you can "tell the difference between weeds and stones", you can choose from two other gardens with stone paths: the sign garden or the grove of three chestnut trees!

Right now I could use some help cutting back the dead stems from last year's plants — in the bioswales, along the north edge of the parking lot, and in the sign garden.

I will appreciate any help you can give, whether it be for a short term/seasonal task, or taking responsibility for a small patch to call your own throughout the summer season!

The fund lost \$ 7,086.24 during March.

As you probably know the stock market had a rough month. I gained perspective in the following excerpt which was taken from the United Methodist Foundation of Michigan Newsletter:

During periods of market instability, it is crucial to remain calm and make informed decisions. Panic selling is a common reaction, but history shows that maintaining a long-term perspective and staying grounded in the core financial strategy often leads to better outcomes. Our investment team adheres to this steadiness with a keen eye on the real-time activity of the markets.

We understand that concerns about a market correction can create uncertainty, but it's important to maintain a long-term perspective. History has shown that markets go through cycles. While short-term volatility is inevitable, sustained growth is typically realized over time.
